Steve's Slant

I have written in this column before that, ordinarily, this is by far my favorite time of year. Outside, fall continues to dazzle like a living tapestry. Pumpkins and apples fill the fruit and vegetable stands, and shorts and t-shirts have long since given way to jeans and sweatshirts.

Inside, we trade iced tea for hot cider, and light blankets are folded up and stored, replaced by down comforters. It's a season both cold and crisp, and warm and fuzzy, and I love it.

Ordinarily. But this is not an ordinary year. Yes, the leaves continue to dazzle but the temperature still feels more like early September than early November. I find myself wearing shorts and t-shirts on the weekends. I'm still drinking more iced drinks than hot drinks, and in our household our sweaters and heavy blankets remain snuggly tucked away in storage.

But of course this is not an ordinary year in another way too. There's the tiny little matter of Election Day, and the fate that awaits us all when the results are finally tallied.

I think you would have to go back to the mid-60s to find a time when America was more divided, or more tense, than it is now. Given the vast differences between the two candidates – differences of temperament, experience and perspective – about the only point of common ground between the candidates' supporters is the anxiety and fear we all feel about the prospect of a win by the nominee of the opposing party.

It's at times like these (not that we've ever been in a time exactly like this!) that I must consciously remember to practice one of the simplest and most pervasive commands we find in scripture: Fear not.

Fear not. There's a reason that this was the continuing message of the angels, because in a world like ours there always has been and there always will be cause to fear, and like a grizzly bear, fear will dominate us and ultimately consume us if we let it.

Fear not. There's a reason we have to be repeatedly instructed to resist our fears, not just because fear is powerful but because it's instinctive when we sense danger. And, yes, it feels to many of us like we are living through a dangerous chapter in our country's history.

Fear not. It's a pervasive command, but it's not easy to obey. The good news is that if you are feeling fearful, you don't have to resist your fears by yourself.

Every time you walk through the doors of our sanctuary, you are joining a body of believers, a gathering of disciples, who seek to follow the counsel of the angels by choosing faith over fear, a community that finds its identity in an alternative narrative to the one playing out on our TV and computer screens and in the daily paper—a narrative filled with stories of God's faithfulness over time, in which hope repeatedly triumphs over fear. 2015 was a good year financially for WWPC

This summary report on the 2015 financial experience of Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church has been delayed for several reasons. Our new bookkeeper came onboard in October of 2015 and Bob Gambrell became the disbursement treasurer in January of 2016. It has taken time for both of us to learn how to do our jobs efficiently. There were a few corrections for 2014 and 2015 that needed to be made in our books though these corrections turned out to be relatively minor.



Actual pledged income (\$168,095) exceeded budgeted pledged income (\$165,000). Regular unpledged income (\$20,555) was only about 80.5% of budgeted (\$25,540), and loose plate offering income (\$6,097) was just over the budgeted amount. Our covenant with the College is resulting in a decreased college contribution over a 5-year period. To balance the budget, income included an anticipated need to transfer \$24,600 from the Memorial fund. The actual transferred amount needed for 2015 was very near \$19,000.

In future years, the Budget and Finance Committee recognizes the necessity of reducing and eventually eliminating annual transfers from the Memorial Fund to achieve a sustainable operating budget.

In summarizing staff expenses, expenditures for the total package for our minister and administrator were very near budgeted amounts, and substantially less than budgeted for our parish associate due to her request in 2015 to reduce her hours in the summer months to spend more time with family.

Funding denominational and other mission programs and local benevolence giving are important to our church. In 2015, \$6,500 was given to the PCUSA general mission program, and an additional \$8,060 was donated to other mission programs and local benevolence programs with line items in our budget. In addition, more than \$10,300 was donated for non-budgeted special offerings such as Souper Bowl, One Great Hour of Sharing, 5 Cents a Meal, Peacemaking, Bowls for the Soul, Pentecost, Habitat, SVCM, and Presbyterian Disaster Assistance.

THANKSGIVING SERVICE

Have you ever wondered how our church's Thanksgiving tradition began?

"All is safely gathered in, now let the winter storms begin" words to a familiar Hymn has set the tone for 83 years the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

Bernhard Laursen, a Dane who had immigrated to Boston and became a citizen, came to teach and work at Asheville Farm School in 1931. He began the tradition of "gathering in" for the Church's Thanksgiving service in 1933. At that time, the school was holding its church services in the parlor of

Sunderland, the men's dormitory. He brought in a shock of corn, several grains, potatoes, apples, and other produce grown on the farm as a display for the service, the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

As the farm manager, he felt that sharing the visual aspect of the harvest would add to the air of thanksgiving. He continued the tradition until his retirement in 1956 and his son Ernst became the farm manager.

Ernst continued the tradition until his retirement in 1996. The students on the farm crew were always involved in the "gathering in from the fields", the gathering of animals and the creation of the display each year.

Beginning in the 1940's the Churches of the Swannanoa Valley met together in the decorated chapel for services Wednesday evening before Thanksgiving with the different churches taking part in the service. This practice continued until the mid 1960's.

This year, we continue to "gather in" on **November 20 at our 11:00** service of worship. We would ask all who would like to bring items to place at the front of the church during the offertory, to bring canned goods that will be distributed to the Swannanoa Valley Christian Ministry.

Join us for this special gathering in the sanctuary, and make sure to thank the student crews for all their hard work!
