Steve's Slant

You will likely not be surprised to learn that the word "holiday" comes from the Middle English words for "holy" and "day."

So, on one hand, it is entirely appropriate to say that our holiday season has officially begun here at Warren Wilson Presbyterian, for we have some truly holy days coming up over the course of the next several weeks. But we have some events planned that look to be just plain fun. I want to give you all an early taste of what lies ahead for us on the church calendar, so that you can mark these dates down on your calendars.

Sunday, November 5th marks our annual observance of **All Saints Sunday**, the day when we remember those loved ones and forebears in the faith whom we've lost during the last year, and celebrat their ongoing legacies in our lives.

Sunday, November 12th marks the **close of our stewardship campaign**. With two Sundays still to go, I can honestly say I have personally found our exploration of the question of what the Lord requires of us, individually and collectively to be deeply meaningful. (And if I may, let me also encourage you either to mail in your pledge before the 12th, or bring it on the day, when we'll receive and bless all our pledges. Both are fine--and welcome!)

Sunday, November 19th we will join together for our annual **Thanksgiving service**, complete with our traditional harvest display. One additional note to add about this year's display. Due to staff and crew reductions on the college side, I have taken the liberty of promising the college crews that install the display -- farm, landscape and garden, to cite the main ones -- that our members will partner with them in the work of installing it. So, keep your eyes peeled for sign ups in the narthex.

And now for something new, and something that I think is going to be really special:

Thursday, November 23 -- Thanksgiving Day -- our Church/College Relations Ministry Team, in collaboration with the College's Office of Spiritual Life, will host a Thanksgiving Day meal here in our Fellowship Hall. Sunday, December 3rd marks the start of Advent for this year. So that also means that on... Friday, December 1^{sd} -- bring your gloves, clippers and pruning shears and join us, starting at 2:30, for the annual Hanging of the Greens, as we beautify the sanctuary for the Christmas season.

Friday, December 1, our annual Christmas Party follows in Fellowship Hall at 5:00 pm.

Wednesday, December 6th -- Congregational Life Team will host our annual Christmas Tea at Highland Farms. The festivities will begin at 2:00 p.m. and will take place in the Parlor, across from the Chapel in the Health Care wing. (Call Sarah Anne Eller or Corise Gambrell for more information.)

THANKSGIVING SERVICE

Have you ever wondered how our church's Thanksgiving tradition began?

"All is safely gathered in, now let the winter storms begin" words to a familiar Hymn has set the tone for 83 years the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

Bernhard Laursen, a Dane who had immigrated to Boston and became a citizen, came to teach and work at Asheville Farm School in 1931. He began the tradition of "gathering in" for the Church's Thanksgiving service in 1933. At that time, the school was holding its church services in the parlor of

Sunderland, the men's dormitory. He brought in a shock of corn, several grains, potatoes, apples, and other produce grown on the farm as a display for the service, the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

As the farm manager, he felt that sharing the visual aspect of the harvest would add to the air of thanksgiving. He continued the tradition until his retirement in 1956 and his son Ernst became the farm manager.

Ernst continued the tradition until his retirement in 1996. The students on the farm crew were always involved in the "gathering in from the fields", the gathering of animals and the creation of the display each year.

Beginning in the 1940's the Churches of the Swannanoa Valley met together in the decorated chapel for services Wednesday evening before Thanksgiving with the different churches taking part in the service. This practice continued until the mid 1960's.

This year, we continue to "gather in" on **November 19 at our 11:00** service of worship. We would ask all who would like to bring items to place at the front of the church during the offertory, to bring canned goods that will be distributed to the Swannanoa Valley Christian Ministry.

Join us for this special gathering in the sanctuary, and make sure to thank the student crews for all their hard work!
