“Welcome Tote” Project

For more than a century, abandoned, abused, neglected, and orphaned children in Western North Carolina have been receiving care through Black Mountain Home for Children, Youth & Families. Begun by Presbyterian minister Robert Perry Smith in 1904, the Home started as an orphanage taking in Appalachian children whose parents had died or disappeared. Today, the Home provides care for children from birth to college graduation through family foster care, residential care, transitional living, and independent living.

The Social Outreach Committee recognizes members of this church who were active and diligent in the process of transforming the reach of this ministry.

The generous donations and gifts of nine complete Welcome Totes are our effort to reinforce the level of support of our congregation to help make each child feel welcome on arrival.

When the Welcome Totes were delivered, 2 Totes were immediately needed and given to incoming teens at the home!

Matt Watroba

Matt Watroba is among the few who can boast a first name basis relationship with almost all of the major folk musicians on the North American continent, as well as possessing a comprehensive grasp of the folk music genre both past and present. He is a highly gifted teacher, writer and performer. His love of folk, roots and traditional music led him to host the “Folks Like Us” program on Detroit Public Radio, a position he held for over 22 years. In 2007, he partnered with *Sing Out!* Magazine to create the *Sing Out Radio Magazine*, an hour-long syndicated radio show heard across the country on XM Satellite Radio. He was awarded “Best Overall Folk Performer” by the Detroit Music Awards, and his long list of credits include the prestigious Ann Arbor Folk Festival, The Old Songs Festival, the New Jersey Folk Weekend, Louisville’s Kentucky Music Weekend, The Fox Valley Festival and hundreds of school and community presentations. He has interviewed and performed with a multitude of performers including Pete Seeger, Jean Ritchie, Odetta and Charlie Louvin. In addition, Matt’s musical partnership with the Rev. Robert Jones has created one of the most sought-after and unique music educational experiences available today. www.mattwatroba.net

Robert Jones has more than twenty years experience as a performer, musician, storyteller, radio producer/host and music educator. He has opened for and played with some of the finest musicians in the world, including BB King, Bonnie Raitt, Willie Dixon, Pinetop Perkins, John Hammond, Howard Armstrong, Chris Smither, Guy Davis and many more. By his mid-twenties Robert was hosting an award-winning radio show on WDET-FM Detroit called “Blues from the Lowland”. Influenced by legendary bluesman Willie Dixon, Robert developed an educational program called “Blues for the Schools” which took him into classrooms all over the country. Answering a call to the ministry, he eventually became pastor at the Sweet Kingdom Missionary Baptist Church in Detroit. He reshaped his “Blues for the Schools” program into “American Roots Music in Education (ARMIE)”, a program that would encompass a wider variety of music including spirituals, gospel and folk songs, and returned to performing in 2006. Especially influenced by musicians such as Rev. Gary Davis, Blind Willie Johnson, Josh White, Blind Connie Williams and Rev. Robert Wilkins, Rev. Jones now performs with good friend Matt Watroba, solo, or with his wife Sister Bernice Jones with whom he presents “Holy Blues” to new audiences. He also has returned to radio as the host and producer of “Deep River”, a program of spirituals and gospel aired on WDET in Detroit. www.revrobertjones.com



Creation Care Alliance

We are continuing our involvement with Creation Care Alliance. The Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church chapter is called The Green Team. One focus of ours is on recycling-so, blue bag, blue bag, blue bag!

If you know anyone building or remodeling ask them to go THE GREEN route. When using herbicides and pesticides, consider all the implications to our environment. Garden with bees and butterflies to feed in your mind, milkweed and nectar producing plants are good. It is important to feed birds during the winter months as seeding plants are not in production. Do not fear bears because they will be in hibernation. Dried corn is good for squirrels and chipmunks.

If you can, do not use electricity and water in excess this puts a strain on our environment. When possible, strive not to drive. I have found that Lowe's will recycle CFL bulbs. Always be on the alert for opportunities to dispose of hard to recycle items. It is good to live in the here and now but remember the next breath you take is in the future. We were only given one earth and we need to care about it for now and in posterity.

SWANNANOVA VALLEY CHRISTIAN MINISTRY

I am writing on behalf of the Swannanoa Valley Christian Ministry. First let me say that all your food and clothing donations are appreciated probably more than can be put in words. But we are more than putting food in people's stomachs and clothes on their bodies. We also have an ever ongoing need for linens, towels, washcloths, blankets, pillows, pots and pans. Another ongoing need is for paper products ie

toilet paper, as well as personal care items such as soap, shampoo, razors, tooth brushes, tooth paste, deodorant, combs and brushes, also feminine hygiene products.

Help with rents, utilities, prescriptions and other medical needs are a service that is provided.

People looking to obtain their GED are helped and Meals on Wheels are also picked up from the SVCM.

As the cold season approaches we will be helping with heating, and the Homeless Shelter that is at the First Baptist Church in Black Mountain will be opening.

As previously stated we are more that about food and clothing and we need monetary donations to operate all the programs we provide. We are always looking to more ways we can serve the valley. Please keep in mind that we will need your services the week we do the shelter. That will be March 26 to April 1.

Let me not forget about the babies and toddlers that are in need of diapers and wipes. If you have any time on your hands volunteers are always needed even if only two or three hours a week, bi-weekly, or monthly.

In July and August the SVCM served 1,247 households, of which 26 were transients.

Thank you from your head to toes and please keep us in your prayers.
