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Steve's Slant

As I write this, in just a few hours the president will give his first State of the Union address since taking office last January. So, per my recent custom, I'm going to follow that example and offer my own thoughts on the state of our union here at Warren Wilson Presbyterian.

I have covered some of this ground already. In December, I sent a message to the congregation in which I shared with you what I deemed to be good news of great joy: that the investments we've made in our Ministry Plan were beginning to bear fruit. I noted that we can now point to measurable gains we've made -- some of them more modest, some of them quite significant -- toward reaching all four of our main goals: improving congregational care, deepening our engagement with and service to the wider community (particularly the college), enhancing our faith development and enriching our worship experience, and, finally, strengthening our church for a sustainable future.

Having detailed those gains earlier, I will not repeat them here. (If you missed that letter, or would like to revisit it, you can find it here: warrenwilsonchurch.org/really-good-news/).

But I do want to underscore some recent news, which Jerry Vaneman, our church treasurer, shared with us at our congregational meeting, following worship on the 21st.

In brief, on the financial side, we're on very solid ground. We finished 2017 comfortably in the black, and we exceeded our challenge pledge budget for 2018. So, taking these things together--the gains we've made toward our goals, and our strong financial footing--we are entering 2018 arguably in the healthiest position we've been in for several years.

So that is obviously news worth celebrating! And thanks must go out in all directions to everyone who has helped get us to this point: Our Session, our Forward Planning Leadership Team, our Stewardship Team, our staff and the leaders of all our ministry teams. And, of course, to all of you for your incredible support and your ongoing generosity, which make our life together possible.

With that said, I would like to share with you a few highlights we can look forward to in the weeks and months ahead.

First, as part of our outreach to the campus community, we're constantly thinking about creative ways to take what we believe -- those of us who gather on the inside of the Chapel -- and make that visible to those who pass by on the outside of the building, those who may never join us for worship.

Session just approved a recommendation that will enable us to do that quite literally. Under the guidance of our Communications Team, we have commissioned a large banner for the front of the Chapel that will look like this:

you are a reighbors. No matter who you wote for, your skin color, your faith, or who you love, we will try to be here for you That's what community means. Let's be neighbors.

New Member Profile

In 1963, when he moved to Atlanta, Georgia, **Bob Castellani** was a brand new college graduate from upstate New York just starting Emory Law School. He got an internship at a local law firm, hired by an office manager who herself had recently moved to Atlanta from Savannah, Georgia.

He married the office manager. Her name was Betty Clanton; she became Betty Castellani, and Bob and Betty had a joyful,



energetic, purpose-fueled life together for fifty years. Bob became a U.S. District Attorney, tried and won cases in the U.S. Supreme Court, and eventually followed his dream to become a judge on the superior court bench. His lasting testament to the Georgia law system was his creation of the state's first drug court, an alternative intensive treatment program to provide rehabilitation instead of incarceration for addicts. Betty had her own high-energy career in ministry and cancer survivorship. And they raised and launched two children into the world, Marc, a clinical psychologist who lives in Charlotte, N.C. with his family; and Robyn, who (spoiler alert!) married a Presbyterian minister and moved to Asheville.

Betty Castellani died in 2014, one week after she and Bob had their 50th wedding anniversary, and now Bob Castellani is moving again, for the first time since 1963. And he's going to make his home in the mountains, and with the church, that he has been visiting since Robyn and Steve married in 2007. He'll be moving full time in October, when his new home at Highland Farms is completed, although in his words, "I wish I could be there yesterday!"

Here, in his words, is why he is coming home to the mountains, and home to us.

In the ten years I've been coming here as a visitor, I've seen how this church takes care of people. I've never seen anyone do it better. And that's what I believe church is all about. I believe that we are on this earth to learn and to teach and to serve. And I want to serve. The work this church does with veterans, with the homeless, with families in trouble...this church does it as well as any group I've ever seen. I feel that we are all fulfilled when we do those kinds of things. I've always found that to be true. It's almost a selfish thing. You feel empowered yourself when you are helping others. You do something for somebody else and you get more out of it than you give.

My wife and I raised our kids in the Presbyterian church. We saw how our kids had a family there. And all my life, my faith has given me direction. There have been various times in my life when I have been lost. Times when I have seriously questioned my place here, why I'm here, whether there is any purpose. And I've always returned to the Bible, the idea of God being a Creator who both means well and does good. I just feel as if there's a time in your life when you have to make a choice. And you can get all intellectual, but at some point you have to decide at some deep level for yourself, is there a purpose to why I'm here? And it seems to me life makes more sense to me if I'm part of a greater creation. A small and insignificant part, but at the same time, you can be an individual and still be somebody who makes a big difference.

I just finished reading a book on cosmology, and the infinite numbers of different worlds and solar systems and galaxies. It's mind boggling, how vast the universe is. And yet I believe we are all, as individuals, still a very important part of it. And I don't know how to explain it except to say I believe there is a greater power in charge of it all.
