Be patient toward all that is unsolved in your heart and try to love the questions themselves, like locked rooms and like books that are now written in a very foreign tongue. Do not now seek the answers, which cannot be given you because you would not be able to live them. And the point is, to live everything. Live the questions now. Perhaps you will then gradually, without noticing it, live along some distant day into the answer.

If you were in worship on the Sunday when we welcomed the students back (August 26^a), you may recall that this quote, from the German poet Rainer Maria Rilke, is the source of the theme for our current sermon series, "Living the Questions."

We began the series that day by exploring the question: "Who do you say that I am?" The question of course comes from Jesus. Nearing the end of his ministry, which is to say, after three years of teaching and traveling together with his disciples, he pauses and asks his main group of followers: Who do you say that I am?

We started the series there because, as a Christian congregation, that may be the most foundational question of all.

Last Sunday, we took a step back -- all the way back -- to the first creation story in the book of Genesis. As you know, that story begins, with this famous and familiar line: In the beginning, God created the heavens and the earth. (This is from the King James translation, the most familiar rendering of the Bible's opening verse.)

We noted that the author of the story presupposes God's existence, takes it for granted, as if the reader would know who it is that he (the author) is talking about when he refers to this God.

So we paused, right there, to ask: God who? Who is this God of whom the author of Genesis speaks? Who is this God of the Hebrew tradition?

In both of these services (and this will also be true in the weeks to come), we give you a chance to reflect on, and answer, these questions for yourself. We are going to make a display of your responses, so that we can all read, enjoy and benefit from them together.

But I want to give you a sampling here, just so you can see the richness of your offerings, as we live these questions together.

We start with: Who do you say that I am?

A new beginning

The light within and around us
Accepting of all

RAPID PROGRESS ON HABITAT FOR HUMANITY PRESBYTERIAN/METHODIST HOUSE # 27; PARTNER FAMILY WILL ATTEND OUR SEPT. 30 WORSHIP SERVICE

Volunteers from our church began working on Asheville Area Habitat for Humanity's Presbyterian/Methodist House # 27 in Arden on July 27, and over the first four weeks of construction contributed more than 70 hours of work on four different dates.

Building continued through August 25, and then resumed after a week off.

Faith partner volunteers will continue to help through September with work including siding, porch framing, flooring, stucco, paint and trim. WWPC members and friends are scheduled to work on five different dates during the month.

Just past noon on Friday, Sept. 21, Habitat will host a special "kickoff" event for this house as well as the Interfaith house also being built in Arden. A potluck lunch will be served, and all volunteers who have worked on either house or are scheduled to work are invited to attend.

On the final Sunday of the month, Sept. 30, the future owner of Presbyterian/Methodist house # 27, Shaketia Simpson, and her children, DaMarion and Mahogani, will attend our worship service and be introduced to the congregation. A special offering to help with the purchase of building materials for the house will also be received that morning.

CLERK's REPORT



Although the activities of the church slowed down during the summer, the session did hold its regular stated meetings. At the June meeting, the session took the following actions:

- 1. Agreed to split the cost of a new HVAC system for the fellowship hall and church offices with the college and to appoint action teams to assess other capital needs and to develop a plan to pay for them.
- 2. Established September 30 as the date for special offering for Habitat for Humanity and the visit of the family who will live in the Presbyterian-Methodist house.
 - 3. Elected Sandy Brauer as its second commissioner to the July presbytery meeting.
 - 4. Approved hiring a student worker for the summer.
 - 5. Revised the personnel policies of the church.
- 6. Authorized the head of the facilities action team to spend moneys in the designated maintenance fund for emergency repairs.
 - 7. Adopted a leave policy for the Director of Music.

In July, the session met with Fraser Penny, our visitor from Scotland. Its only formal action was to authorize paying the local portion of the Pentecost offering to the Apprentice program of the Black Mountain Home for Children.

At the August meeting, the session took the following actions:

- 1. Named Sally Broughton and Nancy Garrison as co-chairs of the 2018 Stewardship Campaign.
 - 2. Approved adult Sunday school classes through October 7.
- 3. Approved Kristin Williams preparing weekly children's classes based on the scripture texts used in the worship service.
- 4. Agreed to place sliders under the communion table and either sliders or wheels under the table used for the candles of concern.
- 5. Accepted with regret Jerry Vaneman's resignation as treasurer and appointed Leslie Sayyar as his successor.
 - 6. Approved a form for requesting checks from the church bookkeeper.
