Steve's Slant

I'll confess up front that this is not the newsletter article I was expecting to write, given that it's now November -- Thanksgiving month -- and that we're also now just two weeks away from the culmination of our stewardship campaign in support of next year's budget.

I thought I might write about things for which we have cause to be thankful, and how the practice of gratitude is even more important than ever in times like these, when the world seems so tense and divided.

Or I thought I might focus on the good news that's coming from the stewardship side: how we've already received just over \$99,000 in commitments -- more than half-way toward our goal of just over \$196,000 -- with two weeks still to go in our stewardship season.

But instead I feel that it's important to address a topic I have never before written about in this context: the stewardship of our safety.

Most of you know by now that, during a routine sweep of the Chapel just before securing the building for the night, Public Safety officers from campus recently discovered a homeless man (age 21) hiding out in the women's restroom. I have recounted the details of that event in a previous email and will not revisit them here.

So, I first want to stress that I do not believe our safety or security is in any immediate risk. For fifty-four years the Chapel has been a place where students and others could come at all times of the day and night to pray or mediate in safety. Though this recent incident was unnerving, that record of more than a half-century of safety remains untarnished. And we trust and believe that this will continue to be true.

That said, as opioid and methamphetamine use have spread to this valley, the demographic profile of this area has changed in ways that do carry security implications campus-wide. And sad as this is to say, last Saturday's tragic shooting at a synagogue in Pittsburgh is all the proof we need that even communities of faith can no longer take the issue of safety for granted.

So, with all of that in view, I plan to ask Session when we meet later this month to appoint an Action Team to begin a thorough review of the question of our collective safety. My recommendation will be that this team consists of representatives of Session, the church staff, and the congregation at large.

During this busy holiday season, our first priority will likely be to assess whether we need to take any immediate steps to improve or enhance the security of our buildings during the day. Our staff sometimes work alone in these buildings. So it will be important to hear from them in order to determine whether we need to do anything in the short-term to enhance the security of our buildings.

"Poverty is not inevitable, Theoharis argues...and all Christians have a responsibility to partner with the poor to end poverty once and for all."

TICKETS NOW AVAILABLE FOR EMPTY BOWLS!

In celebration of National Hunger and Homelessness Awareness Week (November 11-18), Warren Wilson College will hold its 20th Annual Empty Bowls Fundraiser on Wednesday, November 14, 2018, 6:00pm, Ransom Fellowship Hall.



Participants will eat a simple meal of bread and soup served in handmade bowls and, at the end of the evening, take the bowls home as a reminder of the work we can do together to end hunger in our communities. Students from the Bonner Leaders Crew organize this event in collaboration with local agencies to ensure the evening is educational and meaningful for participants.

<u>Students will be selling tickets for this event in the Narthex after church on November 4 and 11</u>. The cost is \$15 for students and \$20 for everyone else. This year's beneficiary, BeLoved Asheville, provides opportunities for people from diverse backgrounds to transform their lives and communities as they tackle some of our toughest community challenges: homelessness, poverty, and racism. Proceeds will support BeLoved's Tiny House Village project, a new model of housing that is deeply affordable, sustainable, and community-oriented.

Emergency Shelter

The Emergency Shelter (ES) at First Baptist Church in Black Mountain is about to open. This shelter is open from Nov 2 through March 31 when the night temperature drops below 39°F. First Baptist Church generously offered their basement Fellowship Hall for use as a shelter, some years ago, after several homeless people froze to death in Black Mountain. This ES serves the homeless in this part of the county -- from the VA Hospital to the McDowell County line. Volunteers work with Sonny Moore, an employee of the Swannanoa Valley Christian Ministry, to make sure that the clients are safe and warm. About half the clients have jobs, but their salary is not sufficient to pay for rental housing. Dinner and breakfast are served and a bag lunch is sent with the clients.

There is a great need for volunteers to work the early shift, which is 4:45 PM until 11:45 PM. With enough volunteers the duty comes around once a month. During that time different churches have volunteered to bring and serve supper, and help clean up. Clients take showers, put their dirty clothes in assigned place to be washed and dried by the volunteers. Lights are out at 10 PM so the clients can get a good night's sleep. There are always two persons on duty and there will be an experienced person there to help get new people acquainted with the system. We have three part time persons paid to work the 11:45 PM to 7:00 AM shift if we cannot get volunteers for that time.

Different churches have volunteered to prepare the evening meal for a week at the time. This year **Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church has the week Dec 30 through January 5**. We will be asking people to sign up to prepare the evening meal and make monetary contributions to cover breakfast and lunch items. This helps to make sure that needed items are available and that we don't have an excess of items that are not needed nad take up refrigerator nad freezer space.

NOVEMBER 18 IS OUR HARVEST SERVICE...

Have you ever wondered how our church's Thanksgiving tradition began?

"All is safely gathered in, now let the winter storms begin" words to a familiar Hymn has set the tone for 84 vears the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

Bernhard Laursen, a

Dane who had immigrated to Boston and became a citizen, came to teach and work at Asheville Farm School in 1931. He began the tradition of "gathering in" for the Church's Thanksgiving service in 1933. At that time, the school was holding its church services in the parlor of Sunderland, the men's dormitory. He brought in a shock of corn, several grains, potatoes, apples, and other produce grown on the farm as a display for the service, the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

As the farm manager, he felt that sharing the visual aspect of the harvest would add to the air of thanksgiving. He continued the tradition until his retirement in 1956 and his son Ernst became the farm manager.

Ernst continued the tradition until his retirement in 1996. The students on the farm crew were always involved in the "gathering in from the fields", the gathering of animals and the creation of the display each year.

Beginning in the 1940's the Churches of the Swannanoa Valley met together in the decorated chapel for services Wednesday evening before Thanksgiving with the different churches taking part in the service. This practice continued until the mid 1960's.

This year, we continue to "gather in" on **November 18 at our 11:00** service of worship. This year, we will also have special music by The Overmountain Recorder Consort. We would ask all who would like to bring items to place at the front of the church during the offertory, to bring canned goods that will be distributed to the Swannanoa Valley Christian Ministry.

Join us for this special gathering in the sanctuary, and make sure to thank the student crews for all their hard work!



God's Mission in Dominican Republic and Haiti

Mission co-workers **Mark Hare and Jenny Bent** work alongside the Dominican Evangelical Church (IED) to provide training and support for Community Health Evangelism (CHE) in IED congregations in Barahona and surrounding communities in the Dominican southwest.

The success of the CHE program, which Jenny piloted with Dominican sugarcane workers living in the Batey 7 settlement in 2012, has led to the introduction of CHE in every region of the country. "CHE empowers, creating resilience in the adults and children who participate," Jenny said.

"The emphasis of CHE is on people using their God-given resources to change their lives and the lives of their neighbors," Mark said. "We are energized by the Holy Spirit blowing through, transforming us as well as the people with whom we work."

Although most of their work is in the Dominican Republic, Mark also travels to Haiti as opportunities arise to support and celebrate the success of Haitian farmers in growing lots of food on small areas of land.

"Ot can be challenging," Jenny said, "to encourage people living in very difficult situations to believe that God has given them all they need. It begins by being the good neighbor-loving God, themselves and those around them, while working to make all their lives better."

Participation will require a commitment to participate in some pre-trip training and orientation sessions. Receiving an official invitation to visit Pine Ridge is a rare and special privilege, so we hope you might give prayerful consideration to joining the group!
