Steve's Slant

Buckle up, friends, because March promises to be a zoomy ride!

On Sunday, March 10th, we SPRING AHEAD one hour, with the start of Daylight Savings Time. (Pro tip: set your clocks ahead when you go to bed on Saturday night or risk being late to church!)

On Wednesday, March 20 -- at 5:58 P.M. to be exact -- the sun will pass over the Equator on its journey back to the northern hemisphere, ushering in the first day of Spring. Hooray! (Side note: Let me assure the amateur astronomers among us that I am aware it's really the earth, not the sun, that's doing most of the traveling in this scenario, but you take my point: Spring is coming!)

On the church calendar, it's a busy month, too. On Wednesday, March 6^{h} , we will mark our entrance into the season of Lent with an Ash Wednesday service at 6:00 p.m. in the chancel area of the sanctuary.

Then, over the weekend of March 22nd and 23rd, first our Session, and then the leaders and key stakeholders of our Ministry Teams, will gather for a leadership retreat at William Black Lodge. I'd like to share a little bit more about what our plan is for the retreat, to invite you to join us as we ponder some important questions.

It's coming up on three years since we launched our Ministry Plan. So the main purpose of this year's retreat will be to review the progress we have made on implementing our plan. What has worked well? What hasn't? What course corrections do we need to make on our continuing journey toward a bright, hopeful future?

You may recall that when we started writing the plan, we sought to discern answers to two questions: Who is God calling us to be? What is God calling us to do?

I believe those questions are still relevant, and we would be wise to continue asking them, to continue discerning ongoing answers to them.

But they were, in turn, informed by another set of questions: How can we grow our congregation? What is the best way to remain a viable faith community in the years to come?

These latter two questions remain vitally important for us. And on that point -- how to grow our church -- I saw some data recently about what brings people to a new church for the first time. The results may surprise you. They certainly surprised me.

Here are the four main drivers that bring people to a new church for the first time, ranked in order:

1. A friend invited me - 86%

- 2. Organized visitation/outreach 6%
- 3. Invited by the pastor 6%
- 4. Advertising 2%

CLERK'S REPORT

At the February stated meeting, the session took the following actions:

1. Received David and Carla Greenfield as affiliate members.

2. Approved hiring a part-time sound technician for worship services.

3. Approved making a gift of \$100 to Bounty and Soul in memory of Bob Martin.

4. Accepted the recommendation of the children and youth to divide the Souper Bowl offering between Manna Food Bank and Bounty and Soul.

5. Authorized the expenditure of up to \$1500 from the General Endowment for the session and leadership retreat.

6. Authorized the expenditure of up to \$2000 from the designated student fund to assist an international student at Warren Wilson College who faces a large medical bill. (Continued on page 4)
