Last Saturday twenty-two adults and children gathered at Camp Grier for our first-ever (at least since I've been here) inter-generational family retreat. Last spring, we scheduled the retreat for a time later in the summer when the swimming pool would still be open, and when we assumed the weather would be warm enough to canoe and to just generally play and enjoy the outdoors.

I had been on a congregational retreat at Camp Grier many years ago myself, and I vividly remember how much fun it was. So I had been looking forward to this occasion for several months. But when the day finally arrived, the morning dawned cool and damp.

There is just no other way to say this, but the chilly temps and the wet conditions dampened our spirits. There is also no better way to say this: Nevertheless we persisted! Grace first led us through some ice-breakers, which were not quite literally true, but that did serve to warm us up some and also helped us get to know one another a little better. (For example, some of us are pie people, others are cake people, and some are both.)

For the center-piece of the morning, we explored together a passage in Luke (13:10-17), which was also the lectionary text for the next day: the story of the bent-over woman. We broke into groups and acted it out, each group taking a different part in the story. We also reflected on it individually, and had a chance to respond to it through a variety of artistic media.

It was a rich time and helped us forget about the weather a bit. Then, after a yummy lunch, the weather cleared up, and warmed up, enough that we had a chance to take some canoes out on the small lake on the property.

The boating was both preceded, and followed, by the most popular activity of the day, particularly for the under 12 set: rope swings!

Eventually the time finally came to load back into our cars and head home. Just before leaving, Gretchen Williams took in her surroundings and announced, "I wish Bible School could start again tomorrow!"

I believe she meant Vacation Bible School. I suspect the fun she had during that week in July, and the fun she had at Camp Grier, blended together into one wonderful memory of having fun with her friends, and making art and playing with adults whom she's come to love.

In any case, I felt like I understood her perfectly. It was a terrifically fun day--an adventure in learning and growing together that we all got to share in together, and I wanted it to start again tomorrow myself!

Grace and I are planning to do a thorough debrief of the retreat -- what worked well, what we might want to do differently next year. We have already talked about the possibility of finding a venue that works equally well for kids as it does for grown-ups, including adults who might have mild to moderate mobility challenges. HABITAT FOR HUMANITY UPDATE ASHEVILLE AREA CHAPTER EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR WILL PARTICIPATE IN OUR SEPT. 29 SERVICE

Construction of Asheville Area Habitat for Humanity's Presbyterian/Methodist House # 28 and other new houses continued at the Curry Court site in Candler in July and August.

During that time 15 different Warren Wilson Church volunteers and four friends of church members helped with our newest faith partner house as well as other houses at this location.

This year, for the first time our Habitat chapter is building two-story, two family units. There will be eight of these when the work is done, along with four single-family units, and a result of this change is that faith partner volunteers have been offered a choice of different things to do at different faith partner houses on the days they work.

For many years our Moment for Mission on the final Sunday of September has been about our Habitat mission, and we have welcomed the partner family for the current Presbyterian/Methodist House and received a special offering to help with the cost of building materials.

Church members who worked on Presbyterian/Methodist House # 22 in Swannanoa may recall that it took a while longer for a partner family to be identified and qualified from Habitat's applicant pool that year, and that is the situation again this year.

Because of that, Andy Barnett, Asheville Area Habitat for Humanity Executive Director since March, 2016,

has offered to join us for our worship service on September 29, and speak during our Moment for Mission.

We look forward to greeting Andy then, and will once again receive a special offering for Habitat that day.

Gas cards: Shell gas cards in \$25 denominations help our families afford trips to Lumpkin to visit their loved ones. Families share with us that these cards help, as they are financially depleted from having a loved one in immigrant detention.

Exterior Enhancement Project: We are transforming our backyard into a wonderful play space and place of relaxation for our families.

Storage shed: We need a storage shed for donations we cannot store in our house, which was built in the 1800s and has just one closet. The shed we need costs \$900.

New and used men's clothing: Shoes in very good condition, sizes 6 and up; new or gently used jeans or casual pants (no dress pants, please) all sizes; men's belts, new or gently used; new or gently used men's casual shirts, such as polo shirts, all sizes; new men's underwear and socks; new or gently used duffel bags or backpacks (must have a zipper). Our particular need right now is for men's jeans and shoes in smaller sizes. We also need white shoelaces, as we received a large donation of sneakers without laces.

Walmart gift cards: Many families struggle to pay for groceries, diapers, and other necessities when their loved one is sent to Stewart.

Second: Last month Session voted to endorse the plan Kristin and Robyn submitted for updating and upgrading our Parlor and Narthex. Most members of our church responded enthusiastically to the draft proposal they distributed to the congregation for review and feedback. But enough people expressed concern about the pace and scope of the proposed changes that Kristin and Robyn suggested to Session that we follow the model of Abraham and Sarah, who journeyed to the promised land in stages. Session agreed that it makes sense to roll out the plan in stages, which will allow us to adapt to and enjoy (!) the changes they've proposed, starting with adding some colorful banners to the narthex.

Finally: Session also approved the plan submitted to them by the Playground Action Team for moving forward on the playground. Installation on that could start as early as mid- to late-September, so you should soon see new swings and slides on the lawn that runs alongside the exit from the Chapel parking lot.
