What are you thankful for? I'll admit, it's a standard question, the one you would likely expect this time of year, as the Thanksgiving holiday steadily comes into view.

For reasons I'll touch on immediately below, I still think it's important to ask it. Plus, it's not the only question I would like to put to you in this newsletter.

The question of what we're thankful for is important, perhaps even essential for such a time as this, because gratitude -- thanksgiving's fraternal twin -- is a key nutrient in a healthy spiritual life. Identifying and naming the things for which we are thankful helps prevent spiritual malnutrition -- scurvy of the spirit, as it were.

So, what are you thankful for? I would genuinely like to know. By which I mean: I would love it if you might email me or drop me a note and tell me what it is you're thankful for. I'm asking because, if you'll indicate that you're okay with my doing this, and if I promise to keep the replies anonymous, I would like to build some of your replies into my sermon on the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

To that end, let me also say this: family and good health are two obvious things for which most of us are thankful. And with good reason. The care, companionship and support of our loved ones, and the ability to get up out of bed in the morning and live a full life, these are among life's most precious gifts.

But this year, let me invite you to go a little deeper. Think about the whole scope of your life. What, or who, makes your life easier, better? What gives you joy? What would you not want to be without? If the most valuable things in life are not things, what items -- or people, or experiences -- are on your list?

If you'd be willing to take a few minutes to jot down some of your answers, and then send those to me (and please feel free to do so anonymously), well, I would be most grateful.

Now, a brief prelude to the other question I'd like to ask.

Donna is due to go out on Monday to have a second hip replacement surgery. This surgery requires her to be out of the office for six weeks. So, first, I invite you to keep her in your prayers.

Also, because she is so essential to the management of our administrative life, we are going to streamline a few things. Joel has graciously agreed to come into the office in the mornings and answer the phone. He has also agreed to help produce our bulletins every week. I will also be answering the phones during the afternoons -- when I'm here.

Clerk's Report

At its stated meeting in October, the session took the following actions:

- 1. Approved the challenge budget for 2020.
- 2. Granted the church administrator an additional ten days of leave for 2019 to assist her recovery from hip surgery and offered her the opportunity to use one week of her 2020 vacation leave in 2019.
- 3. Named Steve Runholt, Ken Murchison, Leslie Sayyar, and Mike Levi as a commission to make plans to cover the duties of the church administrator during her leave and to spend not more than \$2500 from the general endowment for that purpose.
 - 4. Approved adding a flexible spending account option as a benefit for all employees.
 - 5. Accept the audit report for 2018 and expressed its thanks to the team that prepared it.
- 6. Approved the use of Spiritual Nurture endowment earnings to pay registration for youth attending the middle school retreat sponsored by the presbytery.
- 7. Approved the hiring of Beatrice Feay as a probationary nursery employee until her background check is completed.
- 8. Authorized the moderator to call a congregational meeting when the nominating committee notifies him that the committee is prepared to present its report to the congregation.

Report of Giving to Presbytery of Western North Carolina

The Presbytery of Western North Carolina recently sent a report itemizing our giving to the work of the wider church through September 30. It showed that our congregation has given more than \$6000 in gifts beyond our commitment to the unified giving that supports the regular presbytery budget. The largest of our gifts were \$1540 to the One Great Hour of Sharing offering, \$1250 to Gifts of the Hope Campaign, \$1101 to the Five Cents a Meal Offering, and \$1025 to the Christmas Joy Gift offering.

Then, the stewardship team mailed you a letter explaining our stewardship campaign for this year together; it included the 2020 Challenge Budget and the commitment card for next year. A Once a Month Rewarding Lunch

You may not know this, but for many years a small group of our church members and occasionally a friend or family member, has spent about three hours at ABCCM's Veterans Restoration Quarters (VRQ) once a month preparing and serving lunch to the veterans there.

Established many years ago after a homeless veteran froze to death on a street in downtown Asheville, the building, a former motel at 1329 Tunnel Rd, provides a residence for homeless veterans needing transitional housing and support while they find work and independent housing. Services for them include case management, education and training programs, job placement and links to veteran's benefits and peer support.

Volunteers on our "Lunch Cook Team" arrive around 9:30 a.m., or whenever they can get there, on the fourth Friday each month, and do things like grilling chicken, hot dogs or cheese sandwiches, cooking French fries, chopping and dicing vegetables for the salad bar, making salad dressings and sack lunches for veterans who are away at lunch time.

Then, precisely at noon, the men come through a cafeteria line to get their lunch. They are old and young, black and white, in good health or struggling with health, and they are always most appreciative for the support we give, and tell us that. That makes it a most rewarding lunch for the volunteers, and after the residents have been served, we are always invited to sit down and enjoy lunch too.

We have had as many as 10 volunteers on a day, and as few as 3. The ideal group for this is about 6 to 8. Our next three dates to prepare and serve lunch are Nov. 22, Dec. 27, and Jan. 24.

Volunteers are not expected to help every month, but as often as they are available to. If you have questions or would like to know more about this, talk to Barbara or Larry Griswold, Anne or Jamie Dale, Derron Daugherty or Ned Guardenier. Your help from time to time would be most welcome and you would find it a most rewarding lunch.

Having been randomly assigned to one of five groups, 9 members gathered around numbered tables to share introductory stories, "identify themselves", select a coordinator, and begin the process of laying out their future together.

Here's their news:

First off there's the "The Nifty Nine +1" (we had decided on Nifty Nine, but gained another member once we started thanks to Milt joining us) which met for the first time on October 11 at Sandee Butterworth's home. We had a nice "pot-luck" style meal, where everyone got to contribute, and we spent time on their covered porch getting to know one another and enjoying the fantastic weather and mountain views! We decided to try to meet up monthly, and it seems will probably be centered around some sort of meal since we all really enjoy food. Our next meal-event will take place at Fran and Burnace Roberts' home on November 8.

The group discussed the name "Caring Group" in the context of reaching out to someone who may need some caring attention. One member will contact the Congregational Life Team for names of congregants who might enjoy contact from the group's members. They'll also explore the possibility of attending one of the Welcome Table lunches in the Swannanoa Valley, to share a meal that puts them in proximity with people whose paths they may not otherwise cross. At its initial meeting the group decided that the hosts will select a topic for the night. They met on Oct. 20 at the Eagle-Joslin home for a pot-luck dinner. The hosts chose to enjoy the meal first then introduce the group to a communication game called "Vertellis" which was developed in the Netherlands to promote less small talk and more genuine conversations. The evening which began at 5:00 went on until 8:00pm with the group feeling like they knew each other more deeply through their stories and discussion. They have decided to meet on Sunday evenings once monthly if possible at different homes. Their next dinner will be November 24 at the Broughton/Ives home.

THANKSGIVING SERVICE

Have you ever wondered how our church's Thanksgiving tradition began?

"All is safely gathered in, now let the winter storms begin" words to a familiar Hymn has set the tone for 85 years the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

Bernhard Laursen, a Dane who had immigrated to Boston and became a citizen, came to teach and work at Asheville Farm School in 1931. He began the tradition of "gathering in" for the Church's Thanksgiving service in 1933. At that time, the school was holding its church services in the parlor of Sunderland, the men's dormitory. He brought in a shock of corn, several grains, potatoes, apples, and other produce grown on the farm as a display for the service, the Sunday before Thanksgiving.

As the farm manager, he felt that sharing the visual aspect of the harvest would add to the air of thanksgiving. He continued the tradition until his retirement in 1956 and his son Ernst became the farm manager.

Ernst continued the tradition until his retirement in 1996. The students on the farm crew were always involved in the "gathering in from the fields", the gathering of animals and the creation of the display each year.

Beginning in the 1940's the Churches of the Swannanoa Valley met together in the decorated chapel for services Wednesday evening before Thanksgiving with the different churches taking part in the service. This practice continued until the mid 1960's.

This year, we continue to "gather in" on **November 24 at our 11:00** service of worship. We would ask all who would like to bring items to place at the front of the church during the offertory, to bring canned goods that will be distributed to the Swannanoa Valley Christian Ministry.

Join us for this special gathering in the sanctuary, and make sure to thank the student crews for all their hard work!

For the past two years, WWPC has hosted a **Community Thanksgiving meal** for our church and college



community. We will once again celebrate Thanksgiving on Thanksgiving Day, November 28 at 1pm.

We invite all of you to attend. Bring your family! Bring your out-of-town guests! Bring LOTS of food to share.
