Four years ago, on the first Wednesday evening of November, I got in my car and drove to Highland Farms for our monthly Just for Fun event. Remember those? They were, as advertised, fun!

Except that night was not fun. By coincidence the event took place the evening after the 2016 election. Because of that timing, the planning team (as I recall) opted to simply give people time and opportunity to reflect together on the results of the election. Most of us expected the mood to be largely celebratory; that the American people would have chosen a woman to be our next president, shattering the last and highest glass ceiling in the country.

But, of course that is not what happened. Instead of sharing in that celebration with those who had gathered, I spent the evening consoling people I love and care about. At one point, a dear lady approached me with tears streaming down her eyes, and just hugged me tightly, hanging on as if for dear life.

She was not sad because her preferred candidate lost. She was sad for what the days and weeks and months ahead might hold, afraid that our country was about to take a troubling turn toward a much darker future.

I think most people in that room that night shared her concern and her apprehension. But at the time we had no idea of the scope and scale of the crises that would steadily amount over the next four years: the "policy violence" that the administration would visit on the most vulnerable Americans; the race riots that would erupt in our streets; the pandemic that would lock us all in our homes and out of our sanctuaries; the economic meltdown that would leave thirty million Americans out of work and struggling to pay their basic expenses; the ongoing, largely unaddressed threat of climate change.

The final result of this year's election is still being tallied as I write this. But this time around, it seems all but certain that, by a large majority, the American people have voted to "go in a different direction."

I wish I could gather in the Assembly Room at Highland Farms again, with that same group of people, to reflect on this year's results. My guess is the mood would be dramatically different.

Speaking just for myself, I am grateful for this change at the top of our country's leadership. And I very much hope -- I actively believe -- that brighter days are ahead for all of us.

But I am also mindful that there are no messiahs out there; that no one person (or party) can resolve all the crises that we are presently facing as a people and a country. They are too big and too deeply rooted to expect a new president and administration to solve them. And even under the best of circumstances, they certainly will not be solved quickly.

That may sound like hard news. But it is also an opportunity -- for our church and all communities of faith across the country -- to fulfill our calling to be the light of the world, and in our case to be the hands and feet of Jesus right here in the Swannanoa Valley.

Dear Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church,

This year has been extremely challenging, and how to best serve our homeless clients during the upcoming winter months has been discussed at SVCM since late spring. It is impossible to safely hold the shelter in First Baptist Church Black Mountain. It is not advisable to house people in a congregate setting. We also felt we could not safely have volunteers and staff at the shelter. At the present time, there are no emergency shelters planning to open. In talking with the Buncombe County Homeless Task Force, they are advising that we serve the homeless in their camps or cars. So, that is our plan. We will assist in providing the warmest possible sleeping bags, tarps, and tents.

The homeless population that we are currently serving is manageable. We are informing transients from out of town that our area does not have services to provide them and advising they go to a larger city with more resources. We will work with any current clients who are homeless or that we foresee being able to help who are truly our clientele. In past years we have seen folks come to our area because of the kindness and care we give our homeless.

There are several ways you can help. We are going to be hosting meals at the ministry throughout the winter on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and are asking you to provide a meal or meals. We will be serving the meals at 4:30 PM and are expecting to have about 10 people each time. Things like chili, lasagna, and casseroles work best. The kitchen at SVCM is very small and not conducive to a lot of cooking, so we ask that food preparation is done off the premises as much as possible.

You can also donate in the form of a monetary donation or with gift cards that we can give clients to places like McDonald's. You can also donate essential goods that are very important for the homeless, such as:

-Bottles of water-Hand & feet warmers-Power drinks-Chapstick-Protein bars-Sleeping bags designed for cold temperatures-Peanut butter crackers-Thick Tarps-Waterproof gloves-SocksIf you are interested in providing a meal, please contact Ally Wilson at 828-669-9404 orallysvcm@gmail.com.

As it reviewed the financial report for September, the Administration Ministry Team was once again thankful for your generosity and faithfulness. The report showed that commitment giving actually exceeded our budget projection for the first three quarters of the year. Likewise, our other regular giving exceeded

our projections for the first nine months of the year. The only giving item that was below budget was the loose offering, which we have not collected since our last in-person service in March.

Of course, we recognize that some in the congregation have experienced financial hardships that will preclude them from making the contributions they planned to make before the pandemic. However, we could easily make up any shortfall if those of us who were not harmed financially by the pandemic were to increase our gift.

Your continued support for the church in these difficult times has made it possible to continue the ministry of our congregation even though we cannot yet participate in our regular in-person activities. Your gifts make us confident that the church will be in a sound financial position as we begin to resume our normal activities in the coming year.



5 CENTS A MEAL

The presbytery's 5 cents a meal offering funds a variety of activities to help the hungry and those in need. When combined together our small gifts support many important programs. Recent recipients of regional grants from the presbytery include the Beloved Community in Asheville, the Blessing Box in Sherrill's Ford, and Pay It Forward Food Pantry in Lenoir. This year, the presbytery program has also made an international grant to Nkhoma Hospital in Malawi.



Ordinarily, the children pass a basket to collect this offering during worship on the first Sunday of the month. Of course, that method is not available right now, but the offering still needs our support. During the month of November, the 5 cents a meal offering will again be an option for on-line giving. These last four years have been extraordinarily difficult for most of us, and often deeply painful, as well. Without trying to sound an overly partisan note, I am enormously grateful (and, yes, relieved) that they now appear to be coming to an end.

With the start of this new chapter in the life of our country, I am also grateful that our work, our mission, our calling as a congregation, and as individuals, is now about to begin anew.

This Year's Goal for Our Stewardship Campaign

Our Commitment target for the 2021 challenge budget is \$202,864. This is an increase of 2.5% over 2020. Listed below are the highlights for this slight increase:

- 1. We've engaged with the college to share the costs 50/50 of a professional cleaning crew for the Ohler Spiritual Center (the Chapel, the Fellowship Hall and the office wing). Our facilities are still being used -- by church staff and by our financial team, and by the college as a location for socially distanced classroom space. During this time of Covid, we believe it is especially important that our facilities are clean and safe.
- 2. We are hoping to offer genuine raises to our staff for the first time since 2015. (They received raises in 2018 but these mainly restored salary cuts we had to make in 2017.)
- 3. Historically, we have funded the Associate in Ministry position (first Beth, then Grace) with monies from unexpected bequests. We have steadily depleted those funds over the years. To continue funding this critically important position moving forward, we must now build support for this salary into our regular operating fund.
