

Steve's Slant

Let me begin with some personal news. I am delighted to report that at our April meeting, Session approved my request to be granted an eight-week sabbatical, staring this June. With their blessing, I will also add one week of vacation at the end of that break, bringing my total time away to nine weeks.

Now a little background:

Per our internal policies, and in keeping with general denominational recommendations, the pastor here is entitled to take an eight-week sabbatical every seven years. And indeed, I was due to take one, and planning to take one (my second, since coming here in 2005), in the summer of 2020.

Unfortunately, the coronavirus put a decisive end to those plans. Once we closed our doors to inperson worship in March of that year, I felt it was important to stay in place and provide as much leadership and guidance as I could to help us all get through this terrible pandemic, both individually and as a congregation.

Now, two years later, the coronavirus is still out there "in the wild", but the metrics around vaccinations, new infections, hospitalizations and deaths are such that even Dr. Fauci has indicated he believes we are, to quote him directly, "out of the full-blown explosive pandemic phase" and moving toward a more endemic phase of this unwelcome global experience.

So, after two rather grueling years, I feel like the time is finally right to take some time away and to focus on replenishing my own energy and recharging my batteries, in order to continue to provide leadership and guidance as we prepare to enter the next phase of our life together.

And now some additional background:

Before taking this idea first to our Administration Ministry Team for their review, and then to Session for theirs, I sat down with Sarah Grace to discuss the possibility of my being away for most of the summer, and to talk through what that would mean for her. And then to talk through whether she was willing and available to take on some additional responsibility for the time I would be gone. (With additional compensation, of course.)

Outside of regular worship leadership and periodic turns in our pulpit, Sarah Grace's primary focus here is on coordinating and supporting our children's Sunday school programs and family-oriented ministries.

With those pieces largely (though not completely) in abeyance this summer, she was more than agreeable to taking on a larger role here, and fully supportive of my desire to take some extended time away from my day-to-day, week-to-week and month-to-month responsibilities.



The couple believes in working for what they have, and Jesse, a landscaper, looks forward to using his skills on his own property and those of his neighbors.

The 2022 House of Faith is being built in memory of Susan Barbour with funding from the law firm of McGuire, Wood & Bissette in her memory, and from the longtime support of a diverse coalition of area faith communities. These faith organizations have partnered with Asheville Area Habitat to build 49 homes since 1992.

CLERK'S REPORT

At its called meeting on 3 April, 2022, the Session:

- 1. Welcomed Michael Montgomery, Danny Starnes, and Arden Starnes who were meeting with Session to join Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church.
- 2. Heard each share their faith journey with Session at the request of Pastor Runholt.
- 3. Approved a motion by Ken Murchison to accept Michael into Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church upon receipt of membership transfer from Brevard – Davidson River Presbyterian Church and to accept Arden and Danny into Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church upon receipt of membership transfer from Mars Hill Baptist Church or by profession faith as appropriate.

At its stated meeting on 19 April, 2022, the Session:

- 1. Approved a recommendation from the Administrative Ministry Team that Pastor Runholt's request for a sabbatical leave of 8 weeks this summer be granted with plans and arrangements for his responsibilities to be covered as specified in his written request and other discussion at the meeting.
- 2. Heard reports from Sarah Grace Montgomery about having a youth acolyte active in our worship services again and that planning is ongoing for a youth Sunday in June and a vacation Bible school this summer.
- 3. Heard a report from Congregational Life working on a project to improve our contacts with members who have difficulty in getting to regular worship services.
- 4. Heard a written report from Vicki Collins about how our church is supporting the Afghan refugee siblings we have adopted.
- 5. Heard that church donations to One Great Hour of Sharing had reached \$1,400 as of 19 April and that the Session's target of \$500 in donations from the congregation toward the Presbytery's Medical Debt Relief fund to supplement the money already approved by Session has now exceeded \$500. - 6. Approved a motion accepting written procedures reviewed by Session regarding background checks for church staff, nursery workers, and any church person working with children or youth.
- 7. Heard and approved a report of a 2020 audit of our financial accounts with thanks to the audit team and Leslie Sayyar (treasurer), Barbara Escalante (bookkeeper), Brent Roberts (receiving treasurer), and John Laney (investments) for their good work with church finances.
- 8. Heard plans for getting volunteers for a personnel review team and a stewardship team recruited for 2022 and heard a report that our new payroll accounting system is now working well.

Thanking Veterans for Their Service Larry Griswold

Seventeen years ago this month, one year after the World War II Museum opened in Washington, DC, six small planes flew from Springfield Ohio with 12 WWII veterans to honor them with a visit to their memorial.

World War II veterans still living at that time quickly led to a growing waiting list of others from all areas of our country who wished to make the trip and the program began chartering commercial airliners. It also partnered with a new program called Honor Air in Hendersonville, and the Honor Flight Network was born.

As the numbers of World War II veterans declined, the program started taking Korean War veterans to see their memorial, opened in 1995. Honor Flights continued to grow and began taking Vietnam veterans to their memorial, dedicated in 1993.

I am an Air Force veteran who served during the Vietnam War, though I was never sent to Southeast Asia. Last month, after a stoppage of two years due to Covid, our Blue Ridge Honor Flight program resumed, and I went on it to Washington DC and back as a guardian (escort) for two Air Force veterans from Hickory who had served in Vietnam.

We had to be at the Asheville Airport by 6:30 that morning, and after visits to the memorials, Arlington National Cemetery and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier where we watched the changing of the guard, we flew home. On the return flight each of the honored veterans received a surprise "mail call" box filled with cards and letters thanking them for their service.

That group included one World War II veteran, about five Korean War veterans and more than 80 Vietnam veterans, and the mail and large crowd at the Airport who gave the veterans rousing thanks for their service when we returned was an emotional experience to say the least. Very few Vietnam veterans received any gratitude for serving when they returned 50 or more years ago, so this recognition was long overdue and appreciated.

Sometime this month the Honor Flight network will bring its 250,000[™] veteran to Washington DC. Blue Ridge Honor flight will take a whole new group up there on May 21, and I will be with that flight once again as a guardian. (Continued)

I'm also grateful to the AMT and to Session for their unconditional support for this idea, and their willingness to help make it happen.



In the Muslim faith, May 1 was Eid al-Fitr ("Holiday of Breaking the Fast" in English), which marks the end of the month-long observance of Ramadan.

Led largely by Vicki Collins -- but with strong support from the members of our Circle of Welcome here at WWPC -all of the area churches that have welcomed Afghan refugees organized a gathering at Owen Park to help the members of our Circles celebrate this holiday that is so important them, so central to their faith and culture.

The tables -- and there were many, not just the one pictured to the left -- were all growning with food, a dazzling array of dishes ranging from Afghan specialties like *bolani* (stuffed bread) and *sheer yakh* (a sweet, cold dessert, a bit like ice cream, flavored with cardamom and garnished in this case with kiwi fruit -- both dishes made by Farkhunda), to Middle Eastern foods like tabouli, kebabs, hummus and baklava, to traditional American

picnic fare, like potato salad and watermelon, to offer just a partial list of the many different dishes that graced those tables.

The meal was not Communion, per se, but looking at the crowd that had gathered to enjoy it together, the words we often use during our Communion liturgy, inviting people to come to the Table, came to mind:

They will come from the east and the west, the north and the south, to sit at table in the Kingdom of God.

April 27 – Rolls around every year, which isn't often enough to say Thank You!

How many times have you heard.... or said: "Donna, how do I.....", "Donna, would you...?", "Donna, can you help me find...", "Ask Donna, she'll know", "Donna! HELP!" It rings familiar in my head for sure! And thankfully she knows, will, does. While "Thanks, Donna" is part of our regular vocabulary, April 27th was the official Administrative Professionals Day to offer our appreciation. So next time you see She-who-always-has-



a-ready-smile, offer her one of your own, for surely she makes things go more smoothly.
