#### Steve's Slant By Rev. DR. STEVE RUNHOLT



I'll confess up front that I am not an expert on resurrection. I mean, who is, really? What I can say with some confidence is that resurrection always seems to take a fair bit of work. We know this because even Jesus couldn't do it by himself. Either time.

Last Sunday our gospel text was centered on the first great resurrection story in the New Testament: the raising of Lazarus from the dead.

The story begins in grief. Jesus weeps when he is confronted with the reality that his friend, Lazarus, is dead. Even the one whose resurrection we will soon celebrate seems to feel the power of death, the pain of it.

Tears shed, grief expressed: after that is when the work starts.

"Take away the stone!" Jesus commands the onlookers. It's a large stone, too heavy for Jesus to move by himself.

Stone removed, he issues a second command: "Lazarus, come out!" No one knows how this next part happens, but Lazarus obeys Jesus's command. He rises from his death bed and comes stumbling out of the tomb. Well, almost. He gets to the opening and stops. It turns out the story is not over, the work or resurrection not yet complete.

Lazarus is a mess. He is literally bound up in the bands of death.

And so Jesus issues a third and final command: "Unbind him and set him free!" As we noted on Sunday, that's where the story stops. It's as if it's up to the readers to finish it.

We'll see this pattern repeat in just a couple of weeks. It seems likely Jesus had some help with his own rising: someone to roll that heavy stone away; someone to unwrap him from the bands of death that held him tight, arms to his chest. (Continued on page 2)

I say all this because, to me, it feels like we might need a little help effecting our own resurrection. After two years in the tomb, we have in fact risen from the dead. But now it feels a bit like we find ourselves standing in the mouth of that dark cave, still not quite fully alive. If Lazarus's friends had work to do, if the "two angels in white" attending Jesus had work to do, what is ours? I think it might start with asking ourselves some important questions. And with not one but two staff searches now underway, this is the perfect time to ask them. We have done -- you have done -- some of this work already. You've completed surveys about our music. And we've gathered in listening sessions to hear from you directly, as to what is most (and least) important to you in terms of our music program and the person we hire to lead it. But I think there are still more questions to ask:

- Who are we now?
- How has the world changed since Covid?
- How have we changed?
- How important is to attract more students?
- How important is it to attract members of the campus community—faculty and staff?
- How important is it to attract new members more generally, young families more specifically?
- How are other churches doing this?
- How might we do this?
- What graveclothes might we need to shed in order to do this, to rise fully from the grave?

So, that's what we're going to do. After worship on Sunday, April 16th, Session will gather with the members of our two search teams – for our next Director of Music, and our next Associate Pastor – and we're going to ask ourselves some of these questions.

Our hope and intention is to build some of these answers we agree upon into our two job descriptions, as best we can.

That said, I think all have a role to play in rising from the dead. So one last question: What's yours?
