Steve's Slant by rev. dr. steve runholt



On Earth Day Sunday, I shared a story told by Robin Wall Kimmerer, found in her book "Braiding Sweetgrass", about Skywoman, and the role this mythical figure played in the origin of Ms. Kimmerer's tribe, the Potawatomi people.

About this origin story, Ms. Kimmerer writes: The story of Skywoman's journey is so rich and glittering it feels to me like a deep bowl of celestial blue from which I could drink again and again. It holds our beliefs, our history, our relationships. Looking into that starry bowl, I see images swirling so fluidly that the past and the present become as one. Images of Skywoman speak not just of where we came from, but also how we can go forward.

I quote Ms. Kimmerer here because I think what she writes about this most sacred story from her own tradition is also true of our most sacred stories from our own tradition. And I say stories, plural, because I'm thinking not just about the story of Creation, as it comes to us in Genesis, but also, and perhaps especially, about the Easter story.

I also quote her because in this Easter season – this Eastertide – what she writes strikes me as the perfect invitation to stay with our story for a few more weeks, as we make our way from Easter Sunday to Pentecost.

I'm sure most of you have a Bible at home. Some of you may read it regularly. For some of you, it may have gathered a bit of dust of late.

Either way, I encourage you to take it out and read the Easter story again for yourself. Indeed, stretch the experience out a bit. Read all four versions, as told by each of the Gospel writers.

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Steve's Slant continued...

I might suggest you start with Mark's version, as his was the first Gospel to appear in written form. (Spoiler alert: if you are expecting to encounter the risen Christ, you may come away disappointed, as the post-Easter Jesus does not make an appearance in Mark's Gospel. But take heart! Jesus does appear in the other three!)

To borrow Ms. Kimmerer's language, look into that deep, starry bowl and let the story speak to you. Focus on the characters that populate the story -Mary Magdalen, Jesus' mother Mary, Peter, James, John, Thomas, even Judas – and let their humanity speak to you of your past: who you have been at various times in your faith journey; and of your present: who you are now. And perhaps of your future, too: who you aspire to be as you continue to on your faith journey.

Go back as far as you like. Perhaps consider all the hardships in your own life you've come through. The times you have experienced the truth of Easter in your own life: what those have meant to you and how they have shaped you.

Of course maybe you'll realize that some parts of your story feel more like Good Friday than Easter. If that's true, what might it look like for the truth of Easter, the power of Easter, to break through that darkness?


Then, in light of your own rich history, here is the really fun part, think about what it means for all of us to come together, bringing all of our individual stories into one place, all the same time: on Sunday mornings at 11:00.

And might even do this exercise again collectively. Go back as long as you've been here. Think about all the relationships you have enjoyed as a member or regular attender of this church. Perhaps reflect on all the hardships, even the traumas, we have experienced together: the hard loses, mass shootings, hurricanes, Covid, insurrection.

What has Easter meant to you? What has this community meant to you? What is your hope for yourself, moving forward in your journey of faith? What is your hope for us together, moving forward in our shared journey of faith?

Fundraising Concert

Connell Sanderson spent his formative years nurtured by the members of the Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church community. Sunday school, youth group, hiking the campus trails, and throwing countless millions of rocks into the Swannanoa River all helped him develop into the fine young man that he has become.

At age five he decided, after watching the Montreat Pipes and Drums in the Montreat Fourth of July Parade, that his life's mission was to learn to play the bagpipes. He never wavered from that mission, becoming a very fine Highland piper and at age 15 he was a uniformed member, piping with them in the July Fourth parade.

After high school Connell went to work as a finish carpenter, becoming a master of this trade, but his first love was always music. Over the years he grew more fond of traditional Irish music, and after acquiring and mastering various flutes, whistles, and stringed instruments he obtained his first set of Uilleann pipes (also called the Irish Bagpipe) and the rich traditional music heritage of the Green Isles.

This past summer, while touring Ireland with a friend and playing music at every opportunity, he was encouraged by several members of the music faculty of the University of Limerick to apply for their Master's program in music performance and music therapy. Once the paperwork was filed, he was quickly accepted and will be on campus this coming August. To help defray the costs of his education and living expenses while in Ireland Connell will be performing a number of benefit concerts, and WWPC graciously agreed to host the first. Connell will be joined by the very talented Don Penzien for an evening of traditional Irish music that you will not soon forget.

The concert will be in the WWPC Chapel on May 5th, 7 to 9 PM. Cover is \$20 for adults, \$15 for youth/students.

Did you know?

Camp Grier was founded on July 16, 1952 by Robert D. Grier of Statesville, North Carolina as an outdoor ministry of the Presbyterian Church. During the 1940s, Concord Presbytery used Camp Fellowship on the Catawba River.

When Duke Power revealed plans to build Lake Norman, the Presbytery was in danger of losing its camping facilities. Undaunted, Mr. Grier purchased 600 acres of land in Old Fort, NC in the summer of 1950 in order to start another camp for the Concord Presbytery. Mr. Grier set up a saw mill on the camp property and volunteers from the churches built the buildings in Main Camp. The camp was named in memory of Mr. Grier's father, the Rev. John McDill Grier.

Camp Grier is currently located on 655 acres and is surrounded by the first tract of National Forest purchased by the federal government under the Weeks Act. An 8,100 acre tract encompassing the Curtis Creek watershed was purchased for \$7 an acre from the Burke McDowell Lumber Company in 1911. Following in that great tradition of conservation Camp Grier protected a 200 acre tract of property surrounding Jarrett Creek in 2018.

Camp Grier made a commitment almost 50 years ago to provide outdoor experiences for all children. They are still more committed than ever to this value. As kids spend more and more time in front of screens indoors the need for outdoor play has become critical.
