Maybe it's due to the success of Finishing Strong, our recent, Lenten educational series focused on preparing for life's final stages. Or maybe it's due to our proximity to Memorial Day.

Whatever the cause, I have found myself thinking a lot about death this week. You know, in a good way.

For example, I was startled to realize I was thinking about how funny death can be. About the time my Aunt Edith called our house to speak to my mother. How she asked if I would do her a favor when I explained my mom wasn't home.

"Can you deliver a message for me?"

"Sure," I said, in my most mature eleven-year old voice.

"Tell her that Grampa Anderson died."

Me. Tell my mother her sister called to tell her, in turn, that their father, my grandfather, had died.

Like a skit out of Prairie Home Companion: funny but also a tiny bit horrifying. I have been thinking about how beautiful death can be, and how hard. About all the memorial services we have done here, all the lives we have celebrated, all the losses we have grieved together. And all the ministry we have shared in together, all the love our church family has shown, caring for spouses and family members in some of the hardest moments and seasons of their lives.

The number of these services, these goodbyes, is now approaching ninety. I have been thinking about all the lives we've celebrated; the many ways they touched mine, the many ways they contributed to our shared life: the special food they prepared for our potlucks (those bacon wrapped figs!); all the Habitat houses they built; all the lunches and sandwiches they made for others; all the ways they tended to our cemetery; all the resources they helped us steward; all the hymns they played for us, all the anthems they sang. 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I have been thinking about how each one of these beautiful people died differently, their last step an experience entirely their own. How some of them died peacefully, at home perhaps, or in a hospice center surrounded by their loved ones. How some of them died beautifully, a palpable sense of holiness in the room. How some died suddenly, unexpectedly. How all of those deaths, even the peaceful ones and the beautiful ones, were hard.

I am thinking about what a gift these experiences have been, all the lessons I've learned while shepherding individuals through the valley of the shadow of death; all the lessons I have learned helping guide family members out to the other side, safely. About how to be present, how to be available, how to be unafraid, to listen, to pray.

I am thinking about how much I am still learning about death. About the ways our culture and our faith has shaped how we think about life's final stage; how we sometimes say death no longer stings because we have somehow emerged victorious over it. How this can perhaps make death feel like the enemy of life, a foe to be conquered.

And I am thinking about how much there still is to learn. About other ways to see death, and to understand it. How it is possible to view death not as an enemy to be defeated but as a natural part of life, an experience not to be feared but respected. And how the dying process can lead to healing—of memories and traumas, personal and familial.

Mostly I am thinking what an incredible privilege it has been, and continues to be, to share in these experiences with you, to walk through death's dark valley together and to come out on the other side, safely and alive. And I realize that thinking about death in all these ways is, in fact, a very good thing because it makes me value my life more, reminds me that every breath I take is a gift.
