

Steve's Slant

Sometimes the shortest phrases can convey entire paragraphs of meaning and emotion. I would like to share two such phrases with you here.

First: Thank you.

When I announced in July that I would be concluding my ministry here at the end of December, I suspect that some of you probably thought: Great. Just when it feels like our church needs a boost, now everyone is just going to hang back and wait until Steve leaves to see what happens next.

That is not an unreasonable assumption. It's entirely possible such a thing would happen.

But it has not happened. Instead – and I privately predicted this because I know you – the opposite seems to be happening: lots of you are stepping up to support the life and ministries of this church – just when it needs a boost.

And I know that for some of you, that means stepping into roles that are entirely new for you. Maybe you're on the Transition Team, which Session has appointed to oversee and coordinate the details of this transition. Or maybe you've volunteered to serve on our Stewardship Team, or maybe you're serving on one of the other teams that are still busily at work searching for your next Music Director and Associate Pastor.

The list goes on.

Our inward-facing ministries – our Congregational Life team supporting the annual Welcome Students potluck this past Sunday; the Adult Education Ministry Team planning the fall curriculum for the class; the Children's Spiritual Nurture team, doing the same on the kids' side; the Administration Ministry Team doing a ton of heavy lifting, considering all kinds of requests: from Session, from the Associate Pastor Search Team, from the College; requests for allocations from our various music funds to pay for our hand-bells to be refurbished; for some help in paying for the Fellowship Hall and office building to be freshly painted – all of these inward-facing ministries are going on almost as I type these words.

Same on the outward-facing side: the lunch-making brigade continues to turn up the last Friday of every month to feed our neighbors at the Veterans Restoration Quarters; the Habitat crew is gearing up to help build another house (on that point: God bless you, Jimmy Carter for all the houses you built, all the houses you made possible!); support for Homeward Bound as they apply for a grant for affordable housing.

You all are amazing!

But in case you're wondering, there are still plenty of opportunities to jump in and get involved in the work of our Ministry Teams:

- Our children's education program still needs volunteers. Call Natalie Daugherty.
- Do you like to sing? Feel a call to join our choir? Call Beth Meriwether.
- Interested in playing bells? Again, call Natalie Daugherty.

There will be other opportunities down the track:

- Eventually our congregation will elect a Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC).
- Session itself will need some capable, experienced elders to come on board next year.

Short version: Even during this time of transition, a lot of great work and quality ministry is well underway. So thank you!

And do keep your ears and your heart open to where God might be calling you to serve!

Now, I am also aware that many of you are feeling some anxiety about what the future looks like here at WWPC. Again, that is totally understandable. Will there be anyone left on our ministerial staff, and who is going to lead and support us, you might be wondering.

Which brings me to the second two-word phrase I'd like to share with you, the phrase that recurs more frequently in scripture than any other:

Fear not!

Yes, change is coming, but you will be okay!

Yes, perhaps things feel a little unstable right now, but that's normal, even healthy during times of transition.

Short version: Growth without change is impossible. So I would encourage you to lean into the uncertainty of this present moment. Trusting that God is faithful, embrace the change that is coming because new growth, individually and collectively, is always the key to becoming who we are, who we are called to be, who we are meant to be.

EXTERIOR PAINTING PROJECT

Fellowship Hall Repainting

President Fernández has invited Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church to participate in the College's ongoing beautification campaign by painting the Fellowship Hall/Christian Education building. He asked that this be funded by the Church, outside the normal 50-50 expense sharing agreement in the Church-College Covenant, as a WWPC contribution to the College's campaign.

The Session has approved a plan whereby the Church will fund the \$16,880 cost of this badly needed work using Church funds for 50% of the cost and by appealing to the congregation for special contributions to cover the remaining 50%. To that end, members and friends of Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church and Warren Wilson College who so desire can designate funds for this purpose by identifying contributions for the Fellowship Hall Repainting Project.



Ministry Transition Team Formed

The Session has formed an adjunct team of church volunteers, Janice Collins, Jamie Dale, Dennis Stockdale and Rodney Lytle, to support the process of transitioning our pastoral leadership. The Transition Team and Session members met with the WNC Presbytery representatives, Rev. Byron Wade, Rev. Schaap Freeman, and Rev. Wanda Neely (member of the Committee on Ministry (COM)), for guidance on activities to pursue through the remainder of Rev. Steve Runholt's tenure, up to the time when an interim pastor installed. The near-term focus of the team is to support the process to recruit an interim pastor candidate, with guidance and concurrence from the Session, the WNC Presbytery COM, and the congregation. The Presbytery also recommended that we start planning our farewell celebration for Steve (and Robin), potentially including a special service and party. The Transition Team will reach out to the other church teams to help plan this celebration.

Note the WNC Presbytery does not appoint an interim pastor. The Church is responsible for recruiting and contracting with the interim pastor, defining the job responsibilities and budgeting the compensation package. The typical contract is 12 months. The WNC Presbytery will share a list of potential candidates with us, but the Church is also welcome to find their own candidates. An interim pastor is an ordained minister, specifically trained to support a pastoral transition.

Once an interim pastor is in place, this pastor will provide leadership and guidance to the Transition Team to perform a ministry study. Based on the study, the Session and Presbytery will give approval to form a Pastor Nominating Committee, elected by the congregation. The Pastor Nominating Committee will then have the task to work the process to recruit and recommend a candidate to call as the pastor. Once the Session and Presbytery have concurred, the congregation will elect the permanent pastor.

We are planning an "after church" Congregation Information Session with Rev. Schaap Freeman (our Presbytery representative) and the other Presbytery COM members for Sunday, October 22, 2023. The pastoral transition process will be explained in more detail, along with the status of our effort.
