I would guess that most revelers – most Americans for that matter -- are unaware of the history of Halloween, particularly the part about how the ancient observance of All Hallows Eve, a day of remembering the dead, eventually gave rise to the Church's observance of All Saints Day.

I should note that not everyone approves of the revelry on Vermont Avenue. And probably not everyone approves of All Saints Sunday for that matter. It's hard to imagine John Calvin, for example, loving children dressing up in costumes and Trick or Treating for candy, or approving of the idea of remembering the dead. And you certainly won't find anything about Halloween in the Book of Order!

But I think we all instinctively understand the importance of remembering our loved ones. On some deep level it just feels right to commemorate and celebrate the saints who've gone before us: the people whose lives inspire us, by the quality of their own, to be the best versions of ourselves we can be. To fulfill the potential God has entrusted to each of us, individually and collectively.

So even though the tone of the two events is very different – costumes and revelry at one, reverence and respect at the other -- it's honestly not that big of a jump in my mind from Halloween to All Saints Sunday.

- About how to draw on my faith when facing down giants, and trusting God to see me through, to see us through, whatever challenge is coming our way.
- About the value of kindness.

These are just a sliver of the lessons the faithful, departed members and friends of Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church (and the other saints I've known) have taught me over the years. But they are lessons I will take with me when I leave this place. They are a lasting gift for which I am deeply thankful.
