HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

HABITAT DEDICATES FIRST FIVE HOUSES IN ITS NEWEST LOCATION INCLUDING HOUSE OF FAITH #3 WHICH OUR CHURCH SUPPORTED

On May 23 Asheville Area Habitat passed ceremonial keys to the first five homeowners in Arden's Glenn Bridge community including Deborah Humphries who is now the owner of House of Faith #3.

Her house is the 50th Asheville Area Habitat for Humanity house built by a coalition of faith communities and partners. Funding for the house was provided by participating congregations and the Rusty Pulliam Foundation, and Barbara and Larry Griswold sponsored the lot in honor of all faith partner volunteers.

Last fall 11 members of our church helped as volunteers at the site during the early construction of House of Faith #3, and volunteer opportunities will come around again when the House of Faith #4 build starts in October. House of Faith #4 will be a one story townhome with a planned closing date in June, 2025.

The other houses in the recent key passing ceremony included Woman Build #19, Student Build #6, Deerfield IX, and Episcopal House XV.

Hope for Tomorrow, a part of the Swannanoa Valley Christian Ministry, provides housing for mothers and children who are homeless. There are currently five families in the nine available apartments. Several apartments are being refurbished for new families, and one is ready for a new family, but currently available for people to tour. GUATEMALA PROJECT

CELEBRATION OF THREE DECADES OF GUATEMALA PARTNERSHIP

One of the highlights of the April 2024 meeting of the Presbytery of Western North Carolina Was the worship service celebrating 30 years of partnership between our presbytery and the Sur Occidente Presbytery and the Suchitepequez Presbytery in Guatemala. The guest preacher was Osmundo Rene Ponce Serrano, a pastor and former member of Guatemalan National Congress. The text for his sermon was Ecclesiastes 4:9-10: "Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labor: If either of them falls down, one can help the other up." He noted that three decades of working together has made all three presbyteries stronger.

The Guatemala Partnership is a far reaching one. It involves the presbyteries working together in five areas:

a. Education – One of the priorities of the partnership between the presbyteries has been to improve the level of education of the Guatemalan children. In this program, partnership churches form scholarship covenants to offer scholarships for needy children and youth. The program guidelines provide that scholarships are to be given according to need regardless of sex or church membership.

b. Health – The work with the Guatemala presbyteries together in health ministry has several components: church members serving as community health promoters, a children's nutrition program that provides children in many communities a healthy snack on a weekly basis, and a variety of other programs such as vegetable and medicinal herb gardens, composting latrines, fuel-efficient stoves, and family-sized water filters. Presently, a health committee in Guatemala is surveying communities to assess the present status of health knowledge and the local health needs. The primary funding for the health program is the Small Change offering in the Presbytery of Western North Carolina, supplemented by the Alternative Christmas Giving project of the presbytery. c. Church to Church Partnerships – Twenty-nine churches in the Presbytery of Western North Carolina have partnership agreements with congregations in Guatemala. The Presbytery supports partnerships between sister churches in our presbytery and Guatemala through assistance with delegation trips and, communication as well as developing and renewing covenants and policies.

d. Microloans – The Presbyterian Women have established a Microloan Project to provide short-term loans that enable women in Guatemala to embark on or to expand business ventures such as selling food or tortillas, growing corn, raising chicken or pigs, or selling clothing, firewood, or basic supplies. Participants repay loans at the end of a six-month cycle with interest. Adehgua, a Guatemalan non-profit, oversees the project.

e. Men in the Mirror (Hombres En El Espejo) – This initiative is a training program for Men's Ministry in Guatemala. The curriculum helps to address the issue of domestic violence from a male perspective with the recognition that the vast majority of perpetrators of violence in Guatemala are male.

The Guatemala Partnership is another way the Presbytery of Western North Carolina wisely uses the resources we have entrusted to it
