

# A Note from Margaret



#### A Late-breaking invitation:

Dear friends.

As we prepare to welcome students for a new year, some of whom will be coming to the campus for the first time. it has come to the session's



attention that some students feel apprehensive even about entering the chapel, because they suspect they might not be welcomed as they are. In an effort to be transparent about the unconditional love we believe we are called to share with one another, the session decided (during its June 23 meeting) to hang a "rainbow flag" to the left of the chapel doors, in a position parallel to the statement of welcome that hangs on the right. We hope that the symbols and text, hanging on either side of the cross, will invite a rich conversation about how we show up in the world as those who want to keep learning from our neighbors, and together experiencing the transformative love of God.

We intend to hang the flag in mid-August, before students arrive. But you are warmly invited to stay after worship on August 4, if you would like to learn more about the symbolism of the flag and the significance it carries for many. Thank for you being the kind of congregation that is willing to listen with care and respond with courage.

# **GREETERS NEEDED**

#### **SUNDAY SERVICE GREETER SIGN-UP**

The Greeter's main function is to warmly welcome people to the worship service. The Greeter's duties include:

- \* Arrive about 30 minutes before the service begins and assist the Elder of the Day with the information table set-up and put out the bulletins on the stand and tables, as needed.
- \* Stand at the entrance to the sanctuary and welcome people while giving out Sunday worship bulletins as people enter the sanctuary.
- \* Point out the table with the large print hymnals, the hearing assist devices, and the new information sign.
- \* Encourage visitors to fill out information cards so they may join the church's email and paper mail lists to receive more information about upcoming services and events.
- \* After the worship service concludes, assist the Elder of the Day with a quick cleanup of the information table, bulletins and papers in pews, and ensuring that the pew hymnals and Bibles are put in the holders underneath the pews.

# NOTES FROM SESSION

Session has invited several guest ministers over the coming weeks in addition to the richness of speakers we were blessed with during June. You'll be hearing from Keith Grogg, Cindy Riley, and Kevin Frederick. Session is grateful to the vision offered us by Vicki Collins and Lutheran Services. Vicki has recruited the hearts and hands to recreate our Circle of Welcome extending God's love to refugees.

Several elders met with Rev. Dr. Kathryn Johnson Cameron, WWC Ex Officio member of the Board of Trustees as the Presbyterian Representative. The conversation led to in depth review of the Church-College Covenant, which is being refined before resubmitting to the session and BOT in the fall. Subsequently, Session authorized a gift of \$1000 to the WWC annual fund, which helped to boost the college to a record fundraising campaign.

Session recently authorized an action team to explore options for replacing the chapel piano. We are grateful to Dir. of Music Ted Stewart for spearheading this effort. Perhaps you noticed in July a hybrid offering of the Lord's Supper. The Worship & Music Team considered returning to the practice of intinction, and session suggested we offer both the option of receiving an individual cup or sharing from the common cup. You'll have a choice for receiving the sacraments again in August; your feedback is welcome.

Our treasurer reported that receipts of commitments has been strong in recent months, for which we give thanks. Your generosity and steadfastness are indeed gifts. Forty percent of your offerings for the PCUSA Pentecost offering stay in our community. This program focuses on ministries to children at risk, so each year, we offer our young people the opportunity to select the community recipients. Being well-versed in the needs of community and the value of service, our young folks selected the Black Mountain Children's Home as this year's Pentecost Offering recipient.





# **GOOGLE REVIEWS**

In today's digital age, online reviews play a crucial role in shaping people's perceptions and decisions. For churches, Google reviews are not just about feedback; they are a reflection of community engagement and outreach. Positive reviews can attract new members, which we need at Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church! How can you help?

Write a Google Review! It is easy and takes only a few minutes. The only caveat is you have to have a Google Account. If you do, please tell everyone about what you love about our church!

- **Step 1: Open Google Maps** Launch the Google Maps app on your mobile device or visit <u>Google Maps</u> on your web browser.
- Step 2: Search for the Church In the search bar, type "Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church" and press Enter or search icon.
- Step 3: Select the Church Location From the search results, tap on or click on the specific location our church.
- Step 4: Click on the Reviews Section On the church's profile page, click on the Reviews tab at the top. You should see star ratings and a button labeled "Write a review."
- Step 5: Be sure you are signed into Your Google Account If you're not already signed in to your Google account, you'll be prompted to do so. Sign in using your Gmail credentials.
- Step 6: Click on "Write a Review" Click or tap on the "Write a review" button. This will open a review window where you can compose your feedback.
- Step 7: Rate the Church First, select a star rating (from 1 to 5 stars) based on your overall experience with the church. This rating will appear next to your review. (Note, the more 5-star reviews we get, the higher we will get placed on web searches!)
- Step 8: Write Your Review In the text box provided, write your detailed review. Include specific details about your experience, such as the warmth of the community, the quality of the services, or any particular programs or events that stood out to you.
- Step 9: Add Photos (Optional) Optionally, you can add photos to accompany your review. This could include pictures of the church building, events, or services that you attended. Click on the camera icon to upload photos from your device.
- **Step 10: Preview and Post Your Review** Before posting, take a moment to preview your review to ensure it accurately reflects your thoughts and experiences. Make any necessary edits if required. Once satisfied, click on the "Post" button to publish your review.

Leaving a Google review for our church not only provides valuable feedback to the community but also helps others make informed decisions about attending services or events. Your honest review can contribute to the church's online reputation and outreach efforts.

# ASHEVILLE AREA HABITAT ANNOUNCES PLANS FOR NEW FISCAL YEAR INCLUDING HOUSE OF FAITH #4

In a note to Asheville Area Habitat friends on the first day of its new fiscal year (July 1), Habitat CEO Andy Barnett said "With your help, we will serve over 100 local families by building 18 new homes and completing 87 repair projects."

Stating "it promises to be our most ambitious year ever," Andy explained why the goals have been set so high with these words:

"Why do we keep pushing? Because stable housing keeps slipping out of reach for our neighbors. Because homeownership means more than a roof overhead. Because working together builds life-changing connections. Because we have a gritty hope that this movement is building a world where everyone has a place to call home."

One of next year's new homes will be House of Faith #4 which our church will support with monetary donations and volunteer help at the job site.

An organizational meeting in mid-August will provide many more details about this house which, like House of Faith #3, will be built in Habitat's newest neighborhood, Glenn Bridge.

We will also have our annual Habitat Moment for Mission at the start of our Sept. 29 worship service, and, for the first time in many years, have a new Habitat homeowner with us that morning.

I am a Swannanoa Native and a graduate of Owen High School. I found my way back home to the valley in 2017 after being away for over 30 years. Dennis and I moved into Bee Tree Community last year. I love being back in these mountains, hiking the trails,






walking alongside creeks and riverbeds, and enjoying the hospitality of the people. Dennis and I have 4 daughters and 5 grandchildren with one on the way. They live in Asheville, Atlanta, Oklahoma City, and Los Angeles. Good thing I enjoy traveling! I currently serve as the Program Director for Hope for Tomorrow (HFT) at Swannanoa Valley Christian Ministry (SVCM). I am ordained to Word and Sacrament with the Evangelical Covenant Church (ECC) whose closest congregation is in Greensboro, NC. I think this is enough about me to at least start a conversation. So, don't be shy when you see me around.

And now a little bit about the project I am involved with. The ECC denomination invited me to help shape a "Compelling Preaching Cohort" funded by a grant from the Lily Endowment. My focus during the cohort is to develop a mindfulness of those who may have neurodivergent challenges, are dealing with traumatic stress, or have experienced life from a different vantage point than me so the sermons I preach are compelling for the broad audience I may find myself called to share God's word with. Paramount to developing this mindfulness is creating a feedback loop. To that end, I am forming what I am calling a Preacher's Guild comprised of lay persons who might have experience in these areas either personally or professionally, or simply have a passion for the church being a safe place for everyone. The feedback would be focused on how the words spoken are received by people of varied personalities and experiences. The feedback is not focused on Theology in this case. #### Warren Wilson College Has Record Breaking Fundraising Year!

Thanking their donors for their support, Warren Wilson College announced that they have reached the highest WWC Fund total in the College's history! That means that the incredible WWC Fund total of \$1,337,628 will go directly toward increasing access for students, improving learning spaces, providing resources for research, and much more. 
