

# A Note from Margaret

Some of you will know immediately where this picture was taken:





Some of you helped to paint the mural that once covered this wall in our youth room from floor to ceiling. And then came Hurricane Helene. Storm water pooled on the floor and seeped into the drywall. The lower portion of the walls had to be taken down to the studs.

But the workers who replaced the drywall and re-painted the room preserved as much of the mural as they could. They didn't do that at our request—we didn't think to ask! They did it instinctively. And now, the room that was, just a few weeks ago, dark and dank and filled with soggy furniture, is now bright and clean—almost ready to be used again (new flooring has arrived, but is not yet installed!)

There's something about an empty space. It may elicit sadness, when we remember ways we once filled it. But an empty space also holds a sense of possibility. It invites us to imagine what good purpose it might now meet. Whose needs might be answered by an offer of hospitality? With whom will we discover friendship here?

We worship a God who asks us to remember the past, to let it bless us, but not to cling

too tightly to it. This God says to us: "Behold, I am doing a new thing. Do you not perceive it?" Years ago, I heard someone describe this perspective as "living with open hands." Such hands are ready to receive the gifts that each day brings, but also to let those gifts freely pass to the next person who might need them. Living with open hands is a posture of trust.

# SUPPORT HURRICANE HELENE RELIEF EFFORTS


Many folks have expressed interest in helping those severely impacted by Hurricane Helene. That support can address a variety of needs: **1) emergency assistance, 2) initial remediation and restoration, and 3) long-term rebuilding.** Fortunately, Warren Wilson is part of a connectional church that offers trustworthy options to support all three stages of the relief effort.

- 1) The session at WWPC has established the Buncombe County Hurricane Helene Emergency Relief Fund. Contributions to this fund will enable the pastor to respond immediately to emergency needs of members and friends of the congregation, the college community, and the Buncombe County community at large. Distributions larger than \$200 will require session approval. You may support this fund by giving online through the church website, or by giving cash or checks clearly marked for the Hurricane Helene Emergency Relief Fund. You can place checks in the offering plate or mail them to the church.
- 2) The **Presbytery of Western North Carolina** is also preparing to **aid rebuilding in the immediate future.** The General Council approved using reserve funds to hire a relief coordinator for the next two years to coordinate relief efforts within the presbytery. The presbytery has also established the **PWNC Hurricane Relief Fund**, which will provide assistance to individuals within the boundaries of the presbytery, as well as to support work groups that come to the presbytery. Contributions to the fund will also purchase supplies to be used at worksites. All contributions will go directly to relief efforts; the presbytery will use other funds to cover the cost of the relief coordinator position and any administrative costs. You may contribute directly to the presbytery fund by using the link on the presbytery website (<u>presbyterywnc.org</u>) or by mailing checks to Presbytery of Western North Carolina Treasurer, 114 Silver Creek Rd, Morganton, NC 28655. Alternatively, you can make your gifts to Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church and clearly mark them for the PWNC Hurricane Relief Fund. As with other gifts, the treasurer will transmit 100% of your contributions to the presbytery.
- 3) **Presbytery Disaster Assistance (PDA)** is the disaster response and refugee program of the **Presbyterian Church (USA).** PDA has already sent an assessment team to western North Carolina, and a senior leadership team will meet with pastors and other leaders on October 30. However, the **primary focus of PDA efforts is long-term rebuilding and restoration.** PDA remains on the scene until the relief effort is complete. You may give directly by using the link on its website (<u>pda.pcusa.org</u>) or by mailing checks to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, P0 Box 643700, Pittsburgh, PA 15264-3700. If you want your gift to be used in western North Carolina to respond to damage from Hurricane Helene, you should designate it for Project DR000169. Alternatively, you can make your clearly marked gift to Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church, and the church will forward them to PDA. Here also, our treasurer will transmit 100% of your contributions to PDA.





# VETERAN'S RESTORATION QUARTERS (VRQ) UPDATE



On Friday, Sept. 27, as we have on the fourth Friday each month since 2010, a group of volunteers from our church was ready to prepare and serve lunch to 80 100 residents and staff at the VRQ on Tunnel Rd. near the Swannanoa River.

The VRQ is an arm of Asheville Buncombe Christian Community Ministry that provides shelter, education and skills training for up to 160 veterans during their transition to permanent housing. When nighttime temperatures fall below freezing it also provides emergency shelter for up to 40 men.

It is located in a former motel and had a commercial kitchen where lunch volunteers like ours spent the morning cooking meals, preparing items for the salad bar, making salad dressings and sandwiches and assembling sack lunches for residents who were away from the building at meal time.

Then, at noon, the residents and staff came through a cafeteria line where we served the food before they sat down to eat in the dining room. They have always been very appreciative for our help.

Because of the steady rain starting on Sept. 25 and continuing until the extreme rain and winds of Hurricane Helene arrived early on Sept. 27, our volunteers for that day were asked to stay away. Before the day was over everyone there had to be evacuated before 8 feet of water swept through the building, destroying the ground floor including the kitchen and dining room.

The good news is that in less than two weeks temporary lodging for the VRQ residents was setup across Tunnel Rd at the Quality Inn. Because it does not have a commercial kitchen or food storage space however, feeding everyone presented a huge challenge.

Thankfully two of the many disaster relief organizations that have come to provide badly needed help in Western North Carolina, Mercy Chefs and World Central Kitchen, began providing meals that are prepared elsewhere and delivered to the site.

In addition, Team Rubicon, a volunteer organization of veterans specializing in disaster response, has finished cleaning up the mess at the VRQ so that it can be rebuilt, and Veterans Bridge Home is providing volunteer labor, donations and some meals. Many other organizations and companies are also helping with funding for the rebuild which may take a full year.

Until then our church will continue to provide a small number of volunteers at 11:45 a.m. on the 4th Friday of the month to distribute lunches at the VRQ temporary location at 1430 Tunnel Rd. Our next two dates will be Dec. 27 and Jan. 24. #### A New Piano for WWPCI

WWPC is now the new owner of a new piano. It arrived November 26 in time to begin its stay on the first Sunday of the Church Year—Advent I. Last Spring we learned from our piano tuners/ technicians that our 1888 Beckstein piano could no longer be repaired or regulated. 1888 parts are no longer made to fit its piano action. Thus began the search for a new piano.

A Piano Committee was formed, and study and search began. We settled on two brands of pianos in the 7 foot range. When a Yamaha C7 piano popped up on consignment at The Piano Emporium, it was right on target with all of our checkmarks for our desired specifications. We called it a miracle!

Following the recommendation of our Administration Ministry Team, the session approved the purchase on November 19, 2024. The generous bequest of Steven Williams, supplemented with gifts from members and friends of the church, made possible the addition of this wonderful piano to the chapel. Steve was the beloved organist and choir director at Warren Wilson Presbyterian Church for more than 30 years.

Dear friends.

Over the summer Margaret informed the session that she would not be able to renew her contract at the end of 2024, due to increasing needs within her family. On Sunday, November 3, Margaret shared that news in worship. While we will miss Margaret, we understand and support the decision she has made.

We are therefore pleased to announce the arrival of **Rev. Dr. Laurie Furr-Vancini** to serve as our Transitional Pastor in 2025. Laurie has many years of experience in ministry, and comes to us ready to serve. Laurie said, "I feel particularly called to serve Warren Wilson for this season in the life of the church. You are on the cusp of your 100th birthday, between a tragic storm and restoration, navigating a difficult landscape in a time of pastoral transition. Warren Wilson Presbyterian is truly at the threshold between known and unknown and I look forward to walking with you through this turbulent, yet deeply sacred time."

Laurie will begin her work at Warren Wilson on January 2. She looks forward to getting to know each of us and leading us in vibrant worship. Here's a bit of background about Laurie:

After a first degree and career in College Student Affairs, she attended Columbia Theological Seminary and was ordained in the PC(USA). Upon graduation, she moved to Jacksonville, FL with husband Jeff and two young sons to serve a church in the Presbytery of St. Augustine. Soon after the move, they adopted their daughter. They remained in Jacksonville and Laurie served three different congregations over a span of 22 years.

When their third child began college, Laurie and Jeff began planning their move to the mountains of NC, building a home in Black Mountain. They have

been in Black Mountain for three years. During that time, Laurie served as the Transitional Pastor for Hendersonville First Presbyterian Church and is working part time as the Guest Services Manager at Montreat. They have been attending Black Mountain Presbyterian Church, where Jeff is a member.

Laurie enjoys exploring the mountains, the communities, and the arts. She is a reader, YMCA fitness class attender, and daily walker of her dog. She believes in life-long education and is interested and curious about many things. Laurie and Jeff are the parents of 3 adulting children: Charlie and his new wife, Chanterelle who live in New York City. Sam who lives in State College, PA. And Abbie, who lives in Arlington, VA.

Update Your Information

If you 'd like to get setup with Breeze please see the steps below:

#### Setting up with Breeze

This is a guide to help you sign up with Breeze and have access to our wonderful online directory.

- 1. Go to <u>wwpc.breezechms.com</u>
- 2. If you already have an account skip to step 6
- 3. Create an account by clicking "Create Account" below the Sign In button
- 4. Enter your first and last name along with your e-mail address. If you are already in our database, then the system will send you an e-mail with instructions on how to complete your account creation.
- 5. If your name and e-mail address are not already in our database, please contact the church office to be added. Then go back to step 1to complete your account creation.
- 6. Enter your username and password to access Breeze
- 7. Click on "People". Here you can look up members by name to see pictures and contact information.
- 8. To view a directory click "Filters" and a bar will pop in from the right side of your screen.
- 9. Under "Jump to a Saved Filter" select "WWPC Directory"
- 10. Close the Filters sidebar by clicking the X or by clicking anywhere in the main screen.
- 11. You can now see all of the profiles that are part of our Directory. Clicking on any one of them will take you to their profile where you can see pictures and contact information.
- 12. Click the box at the top of the list that says, "Select All People"
- 13. Click the Button to the right that says, "Export"
- 14. Select "Directory" from the pull down menu.
- 15. Click if you would like to "Include pictures" and/or "Group as a family"
- 16. Click the "Download" button on the right
- 17. An up-to-the-minute directory will appear, which you can print if you'd like using your browser's print function.

#### CIRCLE OF WELCOME - SEEKING NEW MEMBERS

Under the auspices of Lutheran Services, our church again formed a circle of welcome to help new Afghan refugees. The Azizi family arrived in September. The father, Miraqa, had served in the Afghan army with American forces, and the Taliban seized all his resources, attacked his family and threatened him. The family was evacuated in the summer of 2024 and has been fully vetted and awarded Special Immigrant status, which is a direct path to a green card. They arrived in Asheville in September.

The family is truly delightful; Miraqa, Tamana the mother, daughter Bebehanya (11) and the boys Maidan (8) and Mudasa (3). Lutheran Services found them a house in Swannanoa, and they weathered the hurricane in amazingly good shape. They quickly made friends and the children are enrolled in local schools.

Our role is to help them adjust to life in America, by driving them to various appointments, helping them with shopping and just finding their way around. Right now, our efforts have been focused on helping them learn English. We are enjoying activities with them and providing a circle of new friends.

The experience has been truly gratifying for our team. We have found wonderful new friends, including several amazing Swannanoa neighbors. We have learned so much: about Afghan culture and food, about the difficulties of navigating life here without money or a car, and how to use imagination in communicating with inadequate translation apps. We would really welcome new team members! Just ask Jamie Dale, Chrisann Ohler, or Vicki Collins about how to participate.
